## SHARED LIVING AGREEMENT QUESTION CHECKLIST

Make sure your agreement covers the following in writing:

- ? How long will they stay with you?
- (?) Will they pay you money? If so, when and how?
- (?) If it's a rental property, will their name go on the lease?
- (?) What are the rules about drinking, smoking, and noise?
- (?) Will they contribute to household bills? If so, which bills?
- ? Do they need to pay a bond to cover potential damages?
- (?) How will the chores and domestic responsibilities be split?
- (?) What are the rules about friends or partners visiting and staying over?
- (?) How many weeks' move-out notice are required if the arrangement is not working out?
